

#### **Overlapping Calls**

Overlapping calls are two or more calls occurring at the same time before the Duty Crew can respond to it. For instance, the Duty Crew could be responding to, arriving at, or at the scene of an incident when another call comes in. In August, we had **7 (11%)** overlapping calls.

#### **False Alarms**

False alarms include system malfunctions, smoke mistaken for steam, calls where we were cancelled prior to arrival and accidental alarm trips. In the month of August, we had 8 false calls – about 13% of our calls.

#### **Call Staffing:**

This chart provides the duty crew staffing levels for the number of incidents. Our minimum is two (at least one Paramedic). Several calls involved the response of paid-on-call staff.

Two FFs on duty: 9 (14%)
Three FFs on duty: 44 (71%)
Four or more on duty: 9 (14%)

#### **HAAS Traffic Alert Activations:**

This chart provides the data surrounding the recent instillation of the HAAS Safey Cloud warning system in four of our apparatus (2 still awaiting the installation). The system allows us to track our fleet's location, traveling speeds, and number of vehicles that were notified by our apparatus when they had their lights and sirens on. In August:

- We alerted **533** total drivers through in-vehicle devices (vehicle navigation/detection systems, Waze® maps, or Apple® maps.
- Our system detected 87 minutes of response time. This is captured by the number of
  minutes an apparatus is detected going lights and sirens from one spot to another (i.e.:
  from the fire station to a call, one call to another, or an incident transporting someone
  emergent from the scene to a local emergency room).
- Our system detected 31 minutes of on-scene time (e.g.: a fire department vehicle parked in or alongside the road warning approaching drivers of an incident - with their lights on - at a scene).

#### **Vehicle Repair, Maintenance, Changes, or Information:**

- Engine 511 was taken out of service in August after "soft" brakes were detected by one of our apparatus drivers heading to a special event. The driver claimed to have difficulty getting the parking brake to set and notified his supervisor. Upon getting it back to the station it was discovered that the rear drums had warped and cracked, and the vehicle was taken out of service immediately. Suttons Bay AG responded to the station and repaired them.
- Ladder 531 returned to service after having been out of service for about a month getting a power steering box leak fixed.
- Alpha 593 went to EV+ (vendor), in Holland, for warranty work.
- Had several members of Glen Lake Fire Department's Ambulance Replacement Committee visit the Lake Leelanau Fire Station to tour Alpha 593. They were hosted by Lt. Schelling – our EMS Coordinator.

#### Fire Prevention/Community Involvement:

- Continued installing smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms, in Leland Township residences, in the month of August. These alarms were installed on Pine Street,
- Built six (6) 9-1-1 address signs. These are sold by the *Leland Volunteer Fire Department* (LVFD)association. August was "Address Sign Awareness Month" for our fire prevention bureau.
- Provided fire and EMS coverage at the Bar-b-cruise.
- Attended the Leland Library's "Touch A Truck" event with Alpha 593 and Engine 512
- Provided several tours or our facilities or apparatus upon request.



- Provided community outreach and information about our department at the Leelanau Farmer's Market in Leland.
- Attended the "National Night Out" event hosted by the Grand Traverse Band Fire & Rescue Department. Engine 511 was featured at this year's event.

#### Fire Station/Infrastructure:

Chief Besson met with a vendor regarding adding security cameras for both stations.

#### **Miscellaneous Things Involving Our Department:**

- Provided automatic mutual aid to Suttons Bay-Bingham Fire
  Department (SBBFD) at a barn fire on East Eckerle Drive. Engine
  511, Utility 585, and Chief 501 responded to the fire. Two LTFR
  firefighters remained in town for coverage.
- Responded to a reported head-on motor vehicle crash with injuries at the corner of Popp Road and East Duck Lake Road (M-204). Leland Township Fire & Rescue personnel responded from both fire stations, with Alpha 593 (ambulance) arriving within 3 minutes of being dispatched. Upon arrival, crews determined that a 23-year-old woman, from Thompsonville, was still trapped in her car. Leland Township firefighters used, recently purchased,



- large extrication tools to help free the woman and then transported her to the trauma center at Munson Medical Center. A second patient, a male in his 20s, was also transported emergently to the trauma center at Munson. He was later transported, by medical helicopter, to a hospital in Grand Rapids for additional care.
- Provided automatic mutual aid to SBBFD for a capsized boat on the West Grand Traverse Bay. Responding LTFR unites: Engine 511 and Alpha 591.
- Ordered turnout gear in conjunction with a State of Michigan grant request that sought approval to purchase all full-timers a second set of firefighting ensembles (aka: turn-out gear).
- Learned that the internal Apparatus Replacement Committee, charged with selecting a new tanker truck, had made their selection. More information will be provided next month.
- Hired James Hill as a fire cadet (non-certified firefighter). James is a
  Leland resident and will be attending his senior year at Leland
  Public Schools. He is scheduled to attend the fire academy this fall
  where he will graduate from high school and the fire academy at
  the same time. Welcome to the team James (pictured at right)!

# Our Month In Pictures



Above: Leland Township Firefighters provided fire and EMS response to a major crash, at M-204 (East Duck Lake Road) and S. Popp Road. Alpha 593 (left) transported a critically injured male to Munson Medical Center followed by Alpha 591, transporting a seriously injured female, who had to extricated from her car first. This photo was taken while both ambulances were at the hospital.

Below: Leland Township Firefighters were dispatched to a low hanging wire at Cedar and First Street, in the Village of Leland. Alpha 593 and Fire Chief 501 responded to the call and discovered a communications line had significantly sagged down due to the weight of the vines attached to it. Crews worked to remove the vines to protect the cars and marked the hazard until Charter could arrive and fix it.









Leland Township Fire & Rescue's Fire & Life Safety (Fire Prevention) Division received a call about an abandoned home on North Manitou Trail, near Sugarbush Lane, that had been vandalized and was the host of several trespassing groups/parties. The caller was concerned that a fire could spread undetected and lead to a loss of life or property. The home sits with 20 feet of a steep cliff looking over Lake Michigan.

Working with the county's building and safety division, the county sheriff's office, and the township offices we were able to locate the property, assess the damage, document the safety concerns and work with the owners to develop a short-term and long-term remediation plan.
