Overlapping Calls

Call Staffing:

This chart provides the duty crew staffing levels for the number of incidents. Our minimum is two (at least one Paramedic). Several calls involved the response of paid-on-call staff.

Two FFs on duty: 5 (7%)

DID YOU KNOW? That Leland Volunteer Fire Department, an association fundraising group, sells the green 911 address signs? The LTFR will take the orders and helps puts the signs together for the group as time allows. A suggested donation of \$20 is kindly requested. Orders can be taken at either LTFR fire station.

Vehicle Repair, Maintenance, Changes, or Information:

- Installed HAAS Alert system, which is a GPS location and advanced driver warning of an approaching emergency vehicle platform, in Alpha 593 (in progress), Chief 501 (in progress), Alpha 591, Engine 511, Engine 512, and Ladder 531. The system allows us to track our fleet's location, traveling speeds, and number of vehicles that were notified by our apparatus when they had their lights and sirens on. We are the first department in the region to have this system installed in multiple vehicles per the HAAS representatives.
- Ladder 531 is out of service (as of August 1st) due to a power steering box leak. It is currently at Frontline Services, in Freeland, getting repaired.

- Installed a mobile radio in Alpha 593. It had been on order and awaiting state programming since February.

Fire Prevention/Community Involvement:

- Installed 16 smoke alarms, in Leland Township residences, in the month of July
- Installed 3 carbon monoxide alarms in Leland Township residences.
- Prepared and installed, where requested, five (5) 911 Address Signs in conjunction with the LVFD.
- Provided fire and EMS coverage at the Leland Fireworks Show.
- Participated in the Leland Fourth of July Parade
- Stopped by and made a community presence at the Artists' Market at the Old Art Building.
- Provided EMS and Emergency Management services for the Fishtown 5K.
- Put Alpha 593, Ladder 531, and Chief 501 on display at the Leelanau Parenting Communities Street Fair ("Kids' Fest") held at the Leelanau Montessori.
- Made a community presence at the Poker Run that was held at Nedows Bay/Bartholemew Park.
- Was notified that we should expect the results of our Public Protection Classification audit (ISO) in late August.
- Performed 6 fire extinguisher demos.
- Provided a visit to the Great Lakes Day Care in Leland providing fire safety education and an opportunity to see the fire trucks.
- Provided community outreach and information about our department at the Leelanau Farmer's Market in Leland.
- Continued administrative work for fire code inspections (future project), entering all of our business occupancy information into ESO – our new reporting and management software, continued developing Quick Action Plans for our businesses for our crews, and populated a list for commercial cooking fire suppression inspections.

Fire Station/Infrastructure:

Had Grand Traverse Sealcoating, via bid process, sealcoat and stripe both fire stations'
parking lots, apparatus approach areas, as well as the easement at the Lake Leelanau Fire
Station.

Miscellaneous Things Involving Our Department:

- Responded to a multi-vehicle collision at M-22 and W. Duck Lake Trail. Both vehicles suffered moderate damage, which forced a temporary lane closure, but both drivers, although shaken up, refused to be transported to the hospital.
- Received word from the State of Michigan that a grant written and submitted by Fire Chief Besson and Township Supervisor Och, for the purchase of a second set of firefighting ensembles (aka: turn-out gear) for our full-time firefighters was approved. The grant award, \$31,500, is in conjunction with the cancer presumption.
- Continued committee work on the purchase of a new tanker truck. The committee is beginning to receive different drawings, renderings, and specs from assorted manufacturers.
- Was highlighted in the Leelanau Enterprise in a story about Vincent Ciricola's, our college intern, experiences working with the Leland Township Fire & Rescue. Pictured to the right: Shift Commander Randy Rosselle helps LTFR College Intern Vinny Ciricola with donning his protective gear during a training exercise.
- Assisted an elderly female at the Houdek's Creek (Leelanau Conservancy property) who had fallen ill deep in the woods. LTFR had to deploy resources to get her in and out – taking the duty crew, assisted by paid-on-call firefighters, almost 30 minutes to reach her. She was transported to Munson Medical Center with suspected dehydration. While the crew was on this incident two other calls for service came in, for us, in Leland Township.
- Purchased a drone to help in capturing footage of incidents, special events, fire investigation/documentation, and training. It was put in service at the Friends of Fishtown 5K and has been very beneficial.



Despite Michigan's Move Over laws necessitating drivers to decelerate and change lanes when approaching active emergency vehicles, delayed or noncompliant reactions persist. Safety Cloud addresses this

The alerts are accessible via the Waze navigation app and Apple Maps, compatible with mobile devices and integrated into the dashboard of many modern vehicles. Safety Cloud alerts are also available on the infotainment screens of millions of vehicles, specifically 2018 and newer models of Jeep, Ram, Chrysler, and Dodge through the EVAS (Emergency Vehicle Alert System) feature. HAAS Alert is actively working on broadening the alerts to more platforms and vehicles.


City fire departments who each have the system in one of their vehicles – we are proud of our commitment to safety, for both the travelling public and our personnel, and our efforts to reduce our risk? Besson adds. "This system has been, or is in the process of being installed, in Engine 511, Engine 512, Ladder 531, our advanced life support ambulances Alpha 591 and Alpha 593, as well as in my assigned vehicle. The work was performed by Radio North in Traverse City. Additionally, the dashboard also allows us to track those units via GPS, when they are in service, and monitor the number of alerts that have been broadcasted to approaching motorists allowing us to see the positive impact this system has when it comes to roadway safety."

According to the HAAS Safety Cloud data - 216 drivers were warned by devices installed in a LTFR apparatus.
